impact report April 2020 - March 2021



This Impact Report highlights the African Education Program's work accomplished from April 2020 through March 2021, a year like no other.

The African Education Program (AEP)'s mission is to empower the youth of Zambia through education and leadership development, to break the cycle of poverty in their communities.

Since 2007, AEP has awarded over 2,600 individual annual scholarships, enabling 450 young women and men to complete high school and 80 to graduate from college. Scholarships enable girls and boys to continue their education in public schools and, most importantly, create a base for the programs provided at the after-school learning and leadership center.

Before COVID-19, on a daily basis, over 400 children and youth took advantage of programs focused on quality education through academic tutoring, leadership development and volunteerism, gender equity, self-esteem building, period poverty elimination, HIV/AIDS and health awareness, nutrition and food security, and the arts and creativity.

AEP's model is based on creating opportunities so that these children and youth can build their resiliency and overcome any challenges that may prevent them from reaching their full potential. This creates an environment for these youth to break out of their impoverished situation and become the leaders that their communities need to end systemic poverty.

In March of 2020, AEP had to close the doors to the center due to the pandemic. AEP launched the COVID-19 Emergency Relief Family Fund and quickly transitioned its work to support everyone's safety and health, while also keeping the youth educationally engaged while schools were shut down.

Dear Friends,

On March 18th, 2020, it was announced that schools in Zambia would close the following week and the declaration of COVID-19's arrival in the country was imminent. I boarded one of the last flights before airlines closed down their Lusaka routes. As I left Zambia that night, I never could have imagined when writing this letter over a year later, I still would not have returned. I never could have imagined the devastation and loss this virus would create in Zambia, in the United States, and around the world. I never could have imagined how the African Education Program's work in Kafue would so drastically pivot in the coming weeks and months.

REMOTE TUTORING

Every week, high school students safely picked up printed learning packets which included lessons and activities in core subjects. The students also received one-on-one tutoring over the phone from assistant teachers (students in their gap year before college who volunteer as tutors and mentors to the younger students.)

Families received three weeks worth of food ahead of a lockdown



COVID-19 EMERGENCY RELIEF FAMILY FUND



AEP continually adapted its health and education outreach programs based on the needs of the girls, boys, and their families, as well as the pandemic surges and the ability to meet safely in-person.

Weekly Health Check-in Calls | The AEP Team in Zambia has been making weekly health check-in calls to about 200 families with phones to monitor the health and well-being of members, dispel myths about COVID-19 in the community, and to share important health-related communications about masks, social distancing and the use of hand sanitizer to keep the virus away.

In-person Learning | When safe to do so, AEP facilitated socially-distance, masked-up outdoor tutoring session for small groups of students. Fortunately, the Read for Rose special education center was able to stay open most of the time due to the small number of students and by firmly following COVID-19 safety precautions. Thanks to a special grant, tablets were purchased for the students to enhance their learning experience.

Remote Learning | AEP also created a "virtual" experience for their student beneficiaries to keep them engaged in their schooling. Educational learning packets were distributed and staff and high school graduate volunteers reached out individually to each student to tutor them remotely through phone calls or individual, socially distanced learning experiences. Due to the constant communication between the team on the ground in Kafue and the families of the student beneficiaries, AEP has a zero school dropout rate which is extremely rare in the surrounding districts in Zambia.

Distributions At the beginning of the pandemic, AEP purchased three-weeks' worth of food for 278 families for an emergency food distribution that took place just in time for a lock-down. Reusable masks made by AEP's Threads of Hope tailoring shop were also distributed to families. Hand sanitizer is also distributed each week to students to use at school.

Thanks to AEP's Scholarship Program, Bester completed high school and recently graduated from the Kafue College of Nursing and Health Sciences as a clinical officer (similar to a nurse practitioner).

Macfarlane and his family are one of hundreds to have benefited from AEP's many COVID-19 initiatives.
















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
